President's Report



I feel privileged to have been the President of this very active Rotary club for the past year. As a club we achieved so much while overcoming a number of challenges. In this report I have tried to pick out the highlights while making reference to some of the regular activities. It is not possible to cover all aspects of the life of an active Rotary club in a few paragraphs.

The theme chosen by Rotary International President Ray Klinginsmith for the current year was "Building Communities, Bridging Continents". This theme was very apt for our club as it fitted in perfectly with the vision of the club. Throughout the year our club was involved in a large number of

projects, and I am proud to state that each one of these either helped build communities or was instrumental in bridging continents. Some of the projects achieved both objectives.

At the outset my aim was the consolidation of all the fantastic work done by Past Presidents and by the club over the six years that the club has been in existence. We had been very active in initiating projects, refining older ones, and making our mark as the most recent addition to the District's list of clubs. We had built an enviable reputation as a dynamic club that was prepared to try new ways and, on occasions, stretch the boundaries. I did not believe it would be possible to maintain this rapid growth in involvement in local and overseas projects.

How wrong was I. When I reflect on the past year I find that we participated in almost all the projects and activities that the club had been involved in over the earlier years, yet at the same time we managed to launch a number of new initiatives.

While achieving so many good outcomes, we also faced a number of challenges along the way. The main one was the shrinkage in the number of members. These people had a variety of reasons for leaving our club – moving out of the area, and finding it too difficult to undertake travelling longer distances on a weekly basis; changes in interest; or just plain loss of enthusiasm for the degree of commitment required by Rotarians.

Another big challenge was the loss of our "Rotary House" as the business owned by two of our charter members, Jenny and Roger Coburn, was fondly known. For years we had been able to rely on Rotary House as the place of storage, the place where items and deliveries were directed, and the place where we could always drop in for a friendly chat, a cup of coffee, and invaluable advice based on the vast Rotary knowledge and experience of the Coburns. This had been the venue for book fairs and other club activities. Jenny and Roger were forced to relocate their business to Burwood giving us the opportunity to assess our longer term requirements and options.

Our Rotary club showed its resilience and resourcefulness in overcoming these two massive challenges, and a number of other less significant ones. It reflects well on all our members that we have achieved so much, have been able to share the increased workload, and are looking to the future with confidence.

On a sadder note, this has been an extraordinary year for all of us, but especially for the victims of the large number of natural disasters in Australia and around the world. No amount of aid will bring back the loved ones lost or the losses suffered, nor will it wipe out the nightmares or memories. At MASH we have tried to ease the pain by making cash donations to the funds set up by the Rotary organisations. This year our donations to disaster victims have totalled \$18,000, made up of \$5,000 for Victorian flood victims, \$3,000 to Queensland flood victims, \$5,000 to Christchurch earthquake victims, \$3,000 to Pakistan flood victims, and \$2,000 to victims of the earthquake and tsunami in Japan.

We have been able to respond to these natural catastrophes and been able to assist financially because we have such a good Fund Raising Committee supported by a good spread of members. Some members turned up at the Saturday sausage sizzle on a regular basis. Some members volunteered for the Open Gardens day. We had a very strong showing of members at the Mont Albert Christmas Fair. The Antiques and Collectables Fair in May involved almost every member at some stage. A small band of volunteers raised considerable funds through the sale of fruit mince pies at Christmas and hot cross buns at Easter. For these last two activities, and many others throughout the year, we are indebted to our member David Winter who has been such a magnificent contributor for many years. We are also grateful to the Surrey Hills Branch of Bendigo Bank for their financial contribution to some of our programs.

With such a strong performance by our fund raisers we were able to participate in several of the District 9810 programs and to initiate new projects of our own. Our District had plans for four major programs. Unfortunately one of these did not proceed due to a number of reasons; however, MASH played a significant role in the other three. These were:

The Primary Schools Speech Competition - this was started in our district by MASH and has now become a district program with 13 clubs and over 50 schools participating. The concept was introduced to us by Robyn Pearson, and was implemented successfully. Robyn and Jenny Coburn then developed the guidelines and procedures to be used by other clubs wishing to introduce this wonderful program.

Proactive Policing car – along with the Rotary Club of Box Hill, MASH provided the funds for acquisition of a suitable vehicle for use by members of the Community Policing team in Whitehorse. The funds came from our income from the monthly Whitehorse Farmers Market. The car is badged with both police and Rotary logos and is a mobile advertising board for the good work of these organisations. We owe many thanks to AG Geoff Roberts and President Peter Cummins of Box Hill for the work they put into this program.

Partnership with Box Hill Institute – in an initiative of DG David Alexander the District is working with the Institute over a range of activities. The first of these is a project that sent a team of apprentices and two instructors from the Institute's trade schools to Munda in Solomon Islands under the leadership of our member Mick Willis. The group is building a Nurses Quarters at the Helen Goldie Hospital to replace a dilapidated one. In addition to the wonderful work done by Mick in setting up the project and securing very significant sponsorship arrangements, MASH made a sizeable contribution to the travelling costs of the apprentices as well as purchasing a laptop and a projector that will be used by the nurses giving them a tool for training. Mick also secured a portable ultrasound scanner for the medical staff at the hospital.

As well as being such good citizens of the District, we have also initiated some of our own programs. The most notable one is the Alcohol and Drug Resource Booklet that is provided to parents of students at intake levels at the two secondary colleges in our area. The booklet was originally developed by Trinity Grammar School. We have arranged for these to be printed locally under licence. The value of this resource (now used by over 50 schools throughout Australia) has been recognised and this is becoming a program available throughout the District.

Another project commenced this year is the Primary Schools Literacy Grant which replaced an earlier program, Dictionaries for Year Three Students. This change is in response to feedback received from the schools and gives a school the flexibility to spend it on dictionaries, library books, or other material related to the literacy program of that particular school.

With respect to the challenges mentioned earlier, we took steps to address these. With the work of our very resourceful and committed Membership and Marketing Committees we have increased the profile of the club in our community as well as throughout Whitehorse, and globally through the use of the internet and social media. We have focused our efforts on potential members who are prepared to make the commitment to Rotary. This appears to be producing results with strong interest being shown by several people.

In another marketing and public relations initiative to help further raise our profile we have acquired a marquee that is liberally badged with the Rotary logo and our club's logo to leave the public in no doubt about our identity in fund raising and community events.

Our second major challenge was resolved through establishing a good relationship with two local scout groups. One of these groups has given us the use of land with the opportunity to create a storage solution for the club's possessions. We now have a shipping container located in Surrey Hills that will help us consolidate all our equipment and will assist team leaders of many projects in finding the items they need. For this storage facility we owe gratitude to the 1st Mont Albert Scouts, and to our members James Hepi and Mick Willis for their personal efforts.

Wrapping up my report on a year full of projects, activities, and events, I would like to thank every member of MASH for their support and contribution. I have named a number of these good Rotarians in the report above, and if time and space had permitted, I would have liked to detail the invaluable contribution of so many others. A successful club like ours is the product of the ideas and effort of all its members. As Rotarians, we do not work for recognition, but for the satisfaction of giving and doing things that are beneficial to all concerned. Together we have lived up to the expectations of the theme of "building communities and bridging continents".

I wish President Elect Tony Kuc and the Rotary Club of Mont Albert & Surrey Hills every success in the future as we all "reach within to embrace humanity".

MEMBERSHIP - 2010-2011

The year started with five fewer members than the peak number reached during the previous year. Three of those leaving the club cited pressures of work and changing responsibilities, while two others had moved out of the area. We hope that in time several of these will return to the club.

This year we ran our information evening in July, which is earlier than usual, and had a good response. A number of younger visitors stayed on afterwards and actively sought information. Disappointingly, by the end of the year none of these had been converted into members.

We suffered further losses early in the year with two members withdrawing due to health issues, one member succumbing to the pressures of having a responsible job and undertaking a masters course at the same time, and one other member deciding that her interests were more aligned to being able to provide hands-on care for people.

Increasing membership is a responsibility for all members and we always encourage members to invite friends, colleagues and business acquaintances to our meetings. As in our club most members are in full time work, and most work out of the area, we have not been getting many referrals.

Our membership team developed an activity plan jointly with the marketing team to ensure a greater visibility of the club, but some delays with brochures and invitation card design work has meant some projects did not come into effect early in the year. Overall as of May 2011 there have been no new members inducted into the club.

Our team has been actively exploring other means of increasing the numbers in the club. Contact was made with Probus clubs in the area to investigate sources of community minded people who may be interested in the good work being done by Rotary. Working with the marketing team we were able to ensure a better exposure of the club's activities, but these pursuits are long term investments in developing an improved profile for MASH.

An additional area of operation for the membership team was the administration of the "Safe food handling" and "Working with Children" programs. A number of members have applied and successfully obtained their Working With Children Card. Several others have participated in the "serving food safely program" recommended by the State Government for volunteer organisations.

The money was raised at the popular Whitehorse Farmers Market, which is held every second Sunday. It took two years to collect the money to buy the hatchback.

Rotary Club of Box Hill president Peter

Cummins said the unit was under-resourced when it came to transport. "We want to reduce crime in the community and make people feel more comfortable in their surrounds," he said.

Mr Cummins said its focus would be on helping younger people get back on track.

The vehicle will be presented to Victoria Police at the farmers market in the grounds of the Nunawading Civic Centre on February 13.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE – The 2010/11 Story

This year has been one of great challenges throughout the world with natural disasters in Pakistan, New Zealand and Japan in addition to significant flooding challenges in our home state of Victoria and in Queensland.

Early in the year, Pakistan was hit by major flooding and our club responded with the donation of aid boxes through Disaster Aid Australia. We distributed collection tins throughout the community for this cause.

Shortly after the terrible earthquake, our club donated \$5,000 to the Disaster Appeal for Christchurch.

During the year Geoff Gartley of Aqua Boxes, a new District 9810 initiative in 2010/11, was one of the speakers as part of our weekly program. Subsequently we provided funds for the purchase of Aqua Boxes which produce clean drinking water for victims of disasters.

Our International Service team of Andreas Klieber, Michael Willis, Graeme Battersby and Chair Roger Coburn were busy all year organising a range of projects.

The team successfully organised the Birthing Kits project for the third year running, and with thanks to a great working bee and the hospitality of Sandy and Mick Willis, we packed 970 Birthing Kits bound for Papua New Guinea.

Whilst this year the club was unable to host the Group Study Exchange team from California due to a change in programming for the team, a group attended the Whitehorse and Manningham Clusters' welcome dinner for that team. Jenny and Roger Coburn home hosted David Vo, a member of that team.

The International Committee has also been busy, actively organising the club's second volunteering visit to Nabukeru, Fiji which is occurring in August 2011. Earlier in the year the club was successful in its application for a Matching Grant from Rotary International to refurbish and re-equip the school library, and to provide computer equipment and power generation equipment that will enable the students to gain skills that are taken for granted in more developed countries. MASH and the six other participating clubs have all contributed the funds they pledged.

Grant monies have been remitted to a special account enabling us to proceed with acquiring the necessary material and items. As part of implementation of the project, a team of 18 will be visiting the village of Nabukeru and will be undertaking the work at the Ratu Nemasi Primary School installing the computers and upgrading the library facilities. In preparation for this trip, representatives from the team visited the Donations In Kind store run by District 9800 where they discovered a treasure trove of equipment, stationery and furniture that would make a big difference to the villagers in Fiji. The Committee approached the club board and obtained funding to send a container of selected goods to Fiji in advance of the volunteering team. It was planned to have the container packed during May, 2011.

Continuing from the club's programs from previous years, again this year we have shipped blankets to the Rotary Club of Shillong in India for distribution amongst the needy in the colder climes of northern India. This program is managed by the Community Service Committee through our links with Alawarra Hostel at the Inala aged care facility.

In another major undertaking the club is supporting the joint program of District 9810 and Box Hill Institute to re-build a Nurses Quarters at the Helena Goldie Hospital in Munda in the Solomon Islands. Our club has contributed funding of \$3,500 from its meeting monies account towards the expenses of sending a team of apprentices and their instructors to Munda where they will work under the leadership of our member Mick Willis, who is also the District Chair for RAWCS. Mick has travelled to Solomon Islands on a number of occasions on personal Rotary Volunteering trips to manage various projects. On this occasion he has secured donations from several building materials suppliers and power tool manufacturers to ensure the project can be carried out successfully. Our club has provided further support for this project by purchasing a laptop and a projector that will be used in training the nurses.

NEW GENERATIONS AND VOCATIONAL COMMITTEE

2010/2011 has been a hive of activity with the New Generations and Vocational Committee team being involved with various local primary and secondary schools within our area.

Primary School Speech Competition

Our 6th Annual Primary Schools Speech Competition was held in August 2010 at Our Holy Redeemer Primary School. Five of the local primary schools attended the event with ten grade six students providing us with an outstanding night of entertaining, humorous and well written presentations. National Youth Science Forum

The candidates are Year 11 and 12 science students who show outstanding potential in their field of science. MUNA

Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA) is an initiative that commenced in Canada in 1980, and was taken up by an Australian Rotary club in 1997. Rotary District 9810 is privileged to have the opportunity to host MUNA in the chambers of the Legislative Assembly at the Victorian Parliament House in Spring Street, Melbourne.

This year we were fortunate to have the opportunity to sponsor three teams. Koonung Secondary College (in our local MASH area) came on board and were very keen to participate. The other two teams came from Beaufort Secondary College and Trinity Grammar School. Jordan Bunphin and Veronica Deutsch form Koonung represented North Korea, Cantona Borg and Jocelyn Crick from Beaufort represented Mexico, and Jamie Clarke and Sam MacFarlane from Trinity represented Kenya. All participants got into the spirit of the weekend and were active in debates putting forward the views of their respective "nations" and voting for resolutions that favoured those nations.

MUNA helps to foster friendships with students from other schools within Melbourne and beyond. The opportunity provides young people with a real insight into understanding the workings of the United Nations whilst building confidence in public speaking and engaging in debates and resolutions.

RYLA

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards is held annually. Each year MASH aims to sponsor one candidate. Last year we sponsored Max Lavery. For this year's weeklong camp, scheduled for early July, we have selected Andrew Reid from the Whitehorse Rotaract Club. Andrew was nominated by President David Barry of that club. Andrew is a very keen participant with Rotaract who is extremely eager to attend RYLA.

The New Generations and Vocational Committee has also considered sponsoring a RYLA team leader in future years. RYLA recognises future youth leaders and motivators aged 18-26. The successful candidates attend a camp in July where they interact with other people their own age and learn to network and share ideas of how to achieve and look for opportunities to succeed through effective communication and leadership whilst building their own self esteem and confidence.

RYPEN

RYPEN aims to provide young people aged 14 to 16 years with the opportunity to develop their leadership potential, alongside their peers in a supportive environment. RYPEN encourages awardees to explore their ideas in problem solving, team and group activities, and gain experiences that will assist them in forming their own values and moral standards. As a part of this, RYPEN is about building confidence and developing skills to cope in a range of situations. RYPEN covers topics on communication, tolerance, drugs and alcohol, police, ethics and social skills.

In our district a three day camp is held in May for participants sponsored by Rotary Clubs throughout District 9810. This year MASH sponsored two candidates from Koonung Secondary College, Kiri McGrath and Jarod Thompson who were recommended by the College staff for their potential to progress to a leadership role with added confidence and training.

Literacy Grant – Primary Schools

Responding to the feedback from a number of the schools, the New Generations and Vocational Committee have introduced a Primary Schools Literacy Grant program for local primary schools. This program replaces the Dictionary program that had been successful for the last couple of years. The Grants program invites schools to nominate their own programmes, or areas in need of funds, relating to literacy for all year levels to a maximum of \$500. The New Generations and Vocational Committee will then review the applications and select the most suitable to enable the Grant presentation to be made to the school by one of our MASH representatives. This project will enable all year levels to take advantage rather than restricting to year three students. We believe this is a great way for the whole school to be involved and will provide assistance where it is most needed.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Sue Pringle (co-chair), Geraldine, Debbie, Leonie and President Joe, for their ongoing contribution and support to all the projects undertaken by our committee. Without your assistance we would not have achieved what we have. Thank you.

Alcohol and Drug Resource Booklets

The club was once again successful in its application for a District Simplified Grant, this time focusing on the theme of a Drug and Alcohol project targeting adolescents through to young adults. Our project involved linking with Trinity Grammar School to promote and make available its Alcohol and Drug Parent Resource Booklet to secondary schools within our community.

The booklet, created by The Trinity Grammar School Parents' Drug & Alcohol Committee, was put together to offer parents of adolescents some useful strategies and helpful information to guide them through the secondary school years in a way that promotes positive adolescent health and well-being. The information presented in the booklet has been gathered from current research and practice and was written with the support of Dr. Michael Carr-Gregg and Associate Professor John Toumbourou, PhD.

Parents of all Year 7 students at Koonung Secondary College and Year 10 at Box Hill Senior Secondary College received the booklet with the Club committing to further supporting the project for the next three years. The positive influence of such a program has seen it expand into a District 9810 program.

Motherhood Unmasked

Motherhood Unmasked is a community project initiated in 2010 by two new mothers living in the City of Whitehorse. They recognized that through the use of Art Therapy they could seek to empower women from a variety of backgrounds to have a voice and connect with others in similar situations.

The project focuses on first time mothers who are at a higher risk of isolation and post-natal depression due to the demands of caring for their newborns. Our club was able to support this project through a \$1000 contribution to assist with the Art Therapy workshops, culminating in an exhibition held at the Box Hill Community Arts Centre during the week ending in Mother's Day.

Rural Relationship

Our close links with the Rotary Club of Beaufort and the township of Beaufort continued through the year. Members of our club made numerous trips to Beaufort and were always met by smiling faces and willing hosts. In November, a sizeable contingent of MASH Rotarians trundled along to help out at the Beaufort Agricultural Show. Some members entered competitions while others helped out with judging of events, manning the information caravan and selling tickets at the gate. MASH also provided prizes to the owners of best of breed in several categories of livestock. Remembering the outstanding role played by the CFA around Beaufort during bushfires over the past several years, MASH once again made a financial contribution to seven CFA units to help them with minor equipment purchases.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS 2010-2011

Treasurer - Nigel Cooper

I am pleased to present a copy of the Club's Financial Statements for the 11 months to 31/5/11. Audited accounts will be provided at the conclusion of the financial year as at 30/6/11.

We continue to raise funds on a regular and well organised basis with our Fundraising account showing a balance of \$15,531 after funds donated of \$53,179. A further \$11,738 has been donated from our Farmers market funds making \$64,917 in all donated to date.

Funds raised to date total \$77,746. This includes \$7,448 from the Farmers market.

Our Administration account has a balance of \$14,251. \$12,555 of these funds are held on term deposit and could be used towards fundraising donations if required.

Total funds on hand are \$29,782. This is \$10,647 lower than the previous year as we work towards ensuring funds are used for worthwhile causes rather than being held unutilised in our bank accounts. Sufficient funds are still held for any special urgent causes that may arise.

Overall the financial position of our Club remains very strong.

Farmers' Market – since the commencement of the Farmers' Market in 2005 our share of profits from this has been \$29,700.

We have distributed \$26,176 to community projects leaving us with a current balance of \$3,524. Donations this year from these funds have been \$10,950 to assist with the purchase of a Community Policing vehicle and \$786 contributed towards Queensland and Victoria flood relief.

Fiji Project – our contribution of \$1,020 to a matching grant has meant we have received funds to-talling \$18,564 for use towards the Fiji project. These funds are held separately to club funds.

ROTARY CULTURAL AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS

The Ambassadorial Scholarships program supports the vision of The Rotary Foundation to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by:

- Increasing awareness of and respect for cultural differences by sending ambassadors of goodwill to study in another country
- Instilling in scholars the Rotary ideal of Service Above Self through active participation in Rotary service projects
- Encouraging scholars to dedicate their personal and professional lives to improving the quality of life for the people of their home communities and countries
- Developing leaders who can address the humanitarian needs of the world community
- Impacting all areas of the world through a balanced geographical distribution of scholars
- Encouraging Rotarians worldwide to increase the educational opportunities for scholars from low income countries
- Fostering a lifelong association between Rotary and its scholars

During the study period, scholars are expected to be outstanding ambassadors of goodwill to the people of the host country through appearances before Rotary clubs and districts, schools, civic organizations, and other forums. After study has been completed, scholars share their experiences with the people of their home countries and Rotarians who sponsored their scholarships.

Under this program each scholar is assigned a sponsor and host Rotarian counsellor / mentor. In 2010 our District 9810 sponsored an Ambassadorial Scholar to Morocco, her studies taking place during the period April to July 2010. The Ambassadorial Scholar Brynna Rafferty-Brown had two mentors, Nicole Osner and Shia Smart, both members of MASH. In fulfilling her commitment to Rotary, Brynna was one of our guest speakers during the year. Following her visit to our club she submitted a short report on her experiences as a Scholar. This report follows..

Report On My Ambassadorial Scholarship

I had the pleasure and privilege of studying at the *Qalam wa Lawh* (Pen and Tablet) Arabic Language School in Rabat, Morocco for three months last year thanks to a Rotary Cultural Ambassadorial Scholarship. As someone who has dabbled in language learning a few times

over the years, I can unequivocally say my experience at *Qalam wa Lawh* was one of the most rewarding learning experiences I am yet to have.

A normal day in Rabat would see me waking up bright and early in my apartment in the trendy suburb of Agdal. After an hour long walk through the streets and beautiful green parks of Rabat I'd arrive at the school, just in time for a glass of water before heading into class. Over the course of my three

months in Rabat I was taught by three different but equally enthusiastic and skilled local teachers. First off, the jokes and good humour of Acrhaf helped bring me back into the world of language learning as I settled into the day-to-day rhythm of life in Rabat. My confidence slowly built up over the month, just in time to be challenged by the intense but incredibly rewarding schedule of Hafida. Finally, as my time in Rabat drew to an end, I had the pleasure of wandering through the joys of Arabic linguistics and history with Hassan.

Outside of classes the school became a second home. Together with teachers and students from all over the world – France, the USA, Chile and Japan, just to name a few – we would sit in the school's garden, chatting over a glass of Morocco's famous mint tea. When lunch time came around, the wafting aromas of the school's kitchen drew us back inside for a hearty meal of Moroccan cuscus, *tagine* and salad. Our classes were also complemented by weekly guest lectures on everything from the traditional importance of bread in Moroccan life, through to the famous folk tales of *Kalila wa Dimna* and a brief history of Moroccan rap. For those keen to explore the city the school also had weekly excursions to places like the king's palace and the ancient ruins of the city of Chellah.

Aside from my studies, the incredible opportunities being in the northern hemisphere entailed were not lost on me. With these in mind, I saved up my pennies and extended my

three month scholarship to a full year away. With many twists and adventures, I ended up taking full advantage of my time away and finished the year with some unforgettable memories...

After two months of study in Rabat, some friends and I decided to take the opportunity to attend the annual ten day World Festival of Sacred Music in Fes. We based ourselves in a traditional three-storey traditional Moroccan house or *riad*, where I was sorely tempted to skip the Festival and spend a full two weeks soaking up the beautifully intricate mosaics and delicate wooden carvings of the riad. After a delicious breakfast, leisurely eaten under the rays of sunlight streaming into the *riad*'s central courtyard, I managed to pull myself

away and began to weave through the maze of Fes' old city in search of the Festival.

As I had hoped, the Festival did not disappoint... I saw a bit of everything, from traditional Buddhist Cambodian ballet, through to Southern US gospel singing, cross-dressing sacred Indian Hindu acrobats and the resonating sounds of traditional Korean drummers. Two of my personal favourites were the Baghdad Jerusalem Ensemble and a local women's sufi group. The Ensemble brought together Jewish musicians from Iraq, Israel and Morocco who together sang songs in Hebrew and Arabic, accompanied by the beautiful sounds of the

Arabic oud. The incredible power and depth of their singing left many of us with goose bumps, a profound sense of sadness for the troubles that divide the region and a deep appreciation of

the rich spiritual tradition that the entire region shares.

The local women's *sufi* group was something else altogether. Part of the Festival's public midnight 'Sufi evenings', these women were serious about their music and clearly didn't need the microphones they'd been given. Led by a woman with a short modern haircut and a mean beat on the tambourine, they were pumping out the praise and blessings with gusto. Groups such as these reinforced once again my impressions of Morocco as an open, diverse

and cosmopolitan country with a wonderfully rich religious and musical history – in which strong Moroccan women most certainly play a role!

After my time in Morocco I decided to head onto Syria where I spent almost four months putting into practice some of what I had learnt at Qalam wa Lawh. Although I had come away from Morocco with strong friendships, it was in Syria that I really felt like I was able to get out in the streets and talk to people - not because they were more friendly, but rather because the Arabic dialect spoken there is much closer to what I'd been learning and is spoken at a much more leisurely speed than the rapid pace of Moroccans.

I used my time in Damascus to let things sink in and reveled in the joy of being able to strike up a conversation everywhere from the local vegetable and fruit juice stalls (a

compulsory feature of every street), to the local mini-buses and religious shrines and mosques. As with Morocco, I have come home with many fond memories and Syrian friends I hope to visit again.

Back in Melbourne, I have been inspired by my time away and am determined not to let the Arabic I learnt fade away. I'm keeping in touch with friends as much as I can and am hoping to develop a curriculum resource highlighting the incredible opportunities

and adventures that learning another language can provide. I am eternally grateful to Rotary for making all of this a possibility and sincerely hope that like me, others will have the opportunity to enrich their lives with similar experiences in future.
